## President's Report

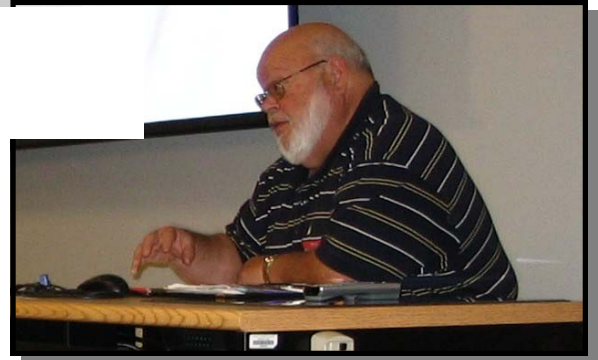
Happy New Year! I sincerely hope 2008 brings you good health, happiness, and prosperity. The year 2008 promises to be very exciting, with the February primary and the November general election, including the election of a new President. Illinois will elect 118 state representatives, and 39 of the 59 state senators are up for election.

The Joliet Junior College Annuitants Association continues to work diligently for present and future annuitants and survivors. JJCAA and SUAA share a common general focus to maintain the integrity of the State University Retirement System.

Throughout 2008 and all the years to come JJCAA will work on your behalf to:

- Protect and improve SURS Pensions
- Protect and improve Health Insurance (Refer to John Peterson's article in this newsletter on health insurance.)
- Protect and improve SURS Benefits
  - Retain or improve the 3% annual cost of living
  - Reinstate the second year sick day credit option
  - Reinstate the Money Market option

The JJCAA Executive Board and committees will continue to maintain or improve relationships with legislators representing District 525 as well as



those

who support the goals and philosophy of SUAA and SURS. Additional goals of JJCAA, SUAA, and SURS include:

- Increasing the death benefit from \$1,000 to \$5,000
- Elimination of the Pension Offset/Windfall Exemption of the Social Security Act

Perhaps the most important responsibility of SURS, SUAA, and JJCAA in 2008 is to keep a watchful eye on developments regarding the convocation of an Illinois Constitutional Convention. Further information is contained in this newsletter regarding this very important possibility and its significant potential impact.

There are 135,000 SURS annuitants and participants in Illinois. That is a considerable block of voters! An annuitant is anyone currently working at JJC who contributes to SURS, as well as retirees and survivors. We need to recruit all non-JJCAA members to join us in the pursuit and attainment of our goals. It has never been more important than in 2008, and this significance will not decrease in the near future.

I urge you to recruit new members and to vote!! Remember, our SURS pension is not a gift. It is deferred compensation.

## JJCAA members and spouses meet with Congressman Jerry Weller

A meeting concerning the Social Security Offsets which may reduce earned Social Security benefits of those on government pensions, such as SURS, was held on July 28, 2007, in Congressman Weller's Joliet office. Participating chapter members were Virginia Allen, Yola and John Corradetti, Sandy Hopper, Mary Ann and Mel Oetter, Joyce Reed, Ileene Sedlacek, Ted Thompson, and this writer.

Joyce Reed, Ileene Sedlacek, and Mary Ann Oetter presented their personal situations, emphasizing how the offsets had affected or will affect their Social Security retirement benefits. The increasing cost of living for those on a fixed income was discussed, as was participants' support for HR82, which is designed to amend Title 2 of the Social Security Act to repeal the Government Pension and Windfall Elimination Offsets. Participants thanked Congressman Weller for his continued support as a co-sponsor of the bill.

An email was received from the House Ways and Means Committee indicating that the Subcommittee on Social Security would be holding a hearing on January 16, 2008, on *Social Security provisions affecting some Public Employees and Other Workers and their Families who face hardship in retirement or in the event of disability or death*. The Social Security Offsets and their effects on public employees will be discussed. Barbara Pavnica, Joyce Reed, and this writer plan to transmit testimony concerning the Government Pension Offset, which often reduces the Social Security Benefit to zero for many public employees (mainly women) who earned lower salaries and pensions.

This fall we learned that Congressman Weller will not seek another term. We thank him for his support throughout the years and wish him well in his family activities and other new ventures. As leading candidates emerge for Congressman Weller's seat, we will contact them about the Social Security Offsets issue.

**Trackman Planetarium** will be holding its second annual *How To Use Your Telescope* seminar on March 1st from 12:30 pm until 3:30 pm. Telescope setup will be on the west side of the bridge. This free seminar is a great place to learn how to set up and use your telescope. 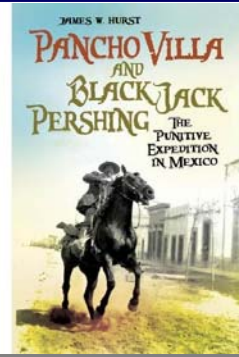

## *Pancho Villa and Black Jack Pershing: The Punitive Expedition in Mexico*

Jim Hurst's latest book has not been released yet. But you may order it now and it will be shipped to you when it arrives at Amazon.com.

According to a book review by Charles H. Harris and Louis R. Sadler, co-authors of *The Texas Rangers and the Mexican Revolution*: "Utilizing for the first time long-neglected Army records in the National Archives, Jim Hurst brings to life this extraordinary campaign that brought the United States and Mexico to the brink of war. **Highly recommended.**"



Mitchell Yockelson, Investigative Archivist, National Archives and Records Administration says, "Jim Hurst's timely book on the often neglected Mexican Punitive Expedition is a great contribution to the study of U.S. Military History. He revises previously held notions that the pursuit of Pancho Villa by Pershing and the regulars was a failure. Rather, as Hurst concludes from his meticulous research in rarely used primary and secondary sources, Pershing's troops had actually decimated Villa's bandits in a series of skirmishes. So by the time the expedition had returned to the United States in early 1917, Villa and his men were largely ineffective and no longer a nuisance to U.S. interests."

Jim retired from the Social Science Department at Joliet Junior College and now lives in Mesilla, New Mexico.

## News of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP)

AARP is entering its 50th year, having been founded in 1958 by Ethel Percy Andrus who created the National Retired Teachers Association (NRTA) in 1947. Then, after receiving requests for health insurance coverage from older Americans who were not eligible for the health insurance offered to members of the NRTA, AARP was established. Ms. Andrus graduated from the University of Chicago, and as the first woman principal in California, worked in that capacity for nearly three decades.

Among AARP Illinois' legislative wins this year were: The establishment of a rural meals program for seniors; the creation of an older rural adults task force; a comprehensive background check for assisted living personnel; a 24 hour elder abuse response system; secure home services prior to hospital discharge; a required fingerprint based background check on all workers of long term care facilities; and a toll-free consumer hotline for complaints against utility companies, and provision for citizen input before the Illinois Commerce Commission.

On the federal level, AARP launched a "Divided We Fail" effort to raise the voices of millions of Americans who believe that health care and lifetime financial security are the most pressing domestic issues facing the nation, to demand that Presidential candidates address these issues. 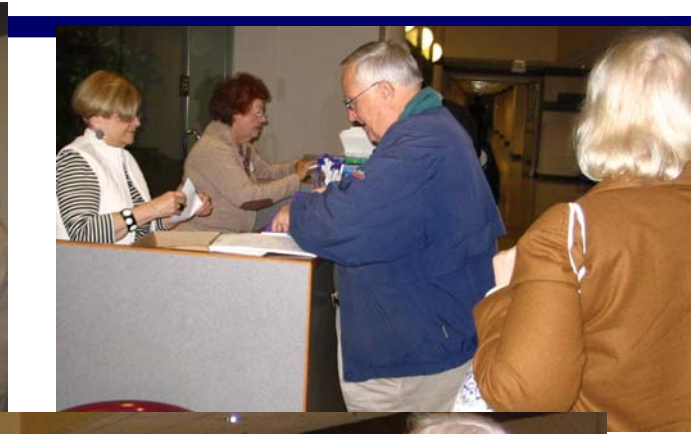
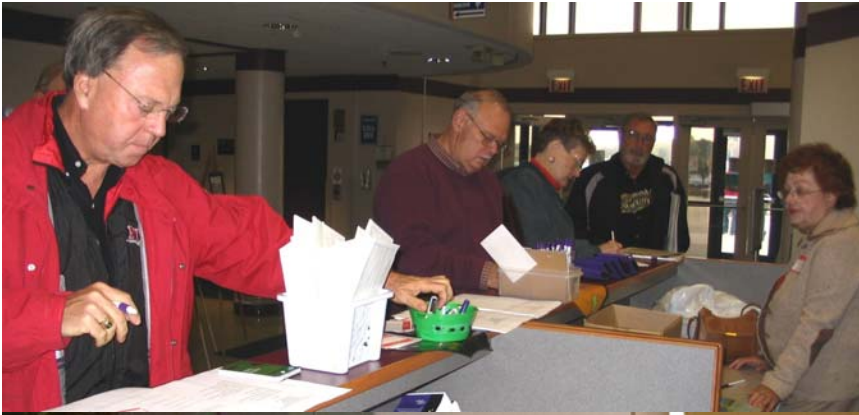

## JJCAA Hosts SUAA Meeting, October 26, 2007

On October 26, 2007, JJCAA hosted a state-wide SUAA meeting for community colleges. Sixteen community colleges were represented.

Linda Brookhart, executive director of SUAA, addressed the participants on a variety of topics including legislation and the role of the community colleges in SUAA.



Dick Lockhart discussed his role as lobbyist for SUAA and the College Insurance Plan contained in Legislation Bill #164. Bill #164 was not enacted in 2007, but once the language is revised, it will be drafted and sent to the Legal Reference Bureau. Dick will take the bill to the legislators to find sponsors.

He hopes the bill will be entered in both the House and the Senate in 2008. He encouraged members to contact legislators about the importance of this bill.

John Peterson, chair of the Insurance Committee, gave a presentation on the committee's recommendations. The committee investigated the cost of buying insurance from an outside group. The cost was prohibitive. He stated the cost of spouses' insurance is one of the main concerns. Currently our insurance is funded equally by the State of Illinois, Joliet Junior College, the retiree, and current employees of the college. Each pays one fourth of the cost.

Jerry Lewis led a discussion encouraging membership in SUAA. It was suggested that chapters should campaign for new members, including retirees as well as current and full-time employees. For the past two years Jerry has met with the various unions at JJC to discuss membership in JJCAA/SUAA. Laws which have removed benefits, such as the two-year sick leave and the loss of the Money Market Formula, indicate the need for a strong organization to fight for benefits. An advertising campaign for new members and luncheon meetings were suggested as possible recruitment activities.

Curt Hiegelke led the discussion about SUAAction. Linda Brookhart encouraged meetings with legislators so they can better understand JJCAA/SUAA issues. Those attending fundraisers will be reimbursed by SUAAction for mileage. Linda stated a generic letter from SUAAction will be forthcoming and may be modified by the local chapter to personalize the letter. Correspondence dealing with SUAAction must go out on SUAAction letterhead and must indicate how money will be spent. Curt suggested a luncheon for legislators be held in Chicago. Currently there is no

legislative reception held in Springfield but perhaps there should be. Legislators attend numerous local activities, including barbeques, hearings, and town meetings. It was suggested that members of SUAA attend such activities and meet with their senators and/or representatives at the end of such meetings. SUAAction cannot use college property for political activities. Ted Thompson and Curt Hiegelke answered questions from the participants. One primary concern dealt with the lack of administrative support from the chapter colleges.

JCAA board members and constituents have been meeting with legislators for almost two years. The legislators learn about JJCAA and our concerns. In return, we are informed of their concerns and how our organization may assist.

Linda Brookhart led a discussion on SUAA and what it can do for you. It was suggested that information sent by SUAA list the chapters on the side of the letterhead. It was questioned whether SUAA represents the community colleges with the same consideration as



universities. Community college chapters are not represented in proportion to the university chapters with respect to offices or board positions. Curt Hiegelke indicated that it is sometimes difficult to understand how SUAA functions. Curt and Ted addressed questions from the group.

Jerry Lewis discussed the topic of communication. SUAA's communication

with the various chapters was discussed. Linda Brookhart said a list of all the presidents was sent by email. All chapters were requested to update their information and keep it current with respect to email addresses.

Communication within a chapter was also discussed. Participants gave input about their activities which included restaurant parties, once-a-month luncheons, breakfasts, and foundations providing lunches for retirees twice a year. Much communication is done via email but some members do not have access. The College of Dupage utilizes email, regular mail, and their web site to get information to their members. Eight of the sixteen chapters represented have newsletters with publication frequency varying from two to four issues per year.

There were questions about long-term care and the three percent annuity increase per year. Long-term care is still available. The three percent increase is not guaranteed by the Illinois Constitution.

Participants felt the meeting was beneficial and allowed an opportunity for open discussion of concerns unique to community colleges. Members felt future meetings would be beneficial. A continental breakfast and bag lunch were funded jointly by JJCAA and SUAA for all participants. A special thank you goes to Carolyn Engers, Sandy Hopper and Mary Ann Oetter for taking care of registration and serving the box lunches.

## JJCAA and SUAAction

JJCAA and SUAAction are ready to proceed with the annual fundraiser for FY 2007-08. The goal of SUAA is to raise \$150,000 by June 30, 2008.

SUAA is a 501(c)(4) organization as defined by the Internal Revenue Service. While SUAA is granted unlimited lobbying, it cannot raise or contribute funds for political activity. That is the role of SUAAction.

SUAAction is registered as a state political action committee (PAC) and is a separate entity from SUAA. However, the goals of SUAAction are designed to complement the legislative goals of SUAA. Political campaign activities include fundraising for candidates for public office and for political parties. Lobbying relates to legislative and administrative issues. It is important to note that JJCAA, JJCAAction, SUAA, and SUAAction are non-partisan.

Our interest through SUAAction is to inform the governor, legislators, and other policymakers about our pension and healthcare issues. Our endeavors through SUAAction should enable us to have greater access to legislative leaders in the House of Representatives and the Senate and to their staffs.

With 2008 as an election year, there will be significant opportunity for SUAAction to determine which candidates running for the General Assembly support pension and healthcare issues. We can then support those candidates who show their commitment to these issues. SUAAction is planning to help sponsor a legislative reception in Springfield for legislators and their staffs during 2008 to raise awareness of the importance of pension funding and healthcare benefits.

If a Constitutional Convention is approved by the voters on November 8, 2008, SUAAction will also be positioned to support delegates who are sensitive to the needs of preserving pension and retirement rights that are protected under the current Illinois Constitution.

You will receive a letter asking for SUAAction contributions. A copy of the SUAA legislative goals will be included with the SUAAction letter. JJCAA cannot accept funds for SUAAction; those funds must go directly to SUAAction. State SUAAction will fund the local efforts that we identify and communicate to them as our needs.

All contributions will gladly be accepted. All of us know that a contribution signifies that an individual is "buying into" the role of SUAAction as a helpful component for SUAA's legislative agenda involving political activities. It should be noted that there is no mention of Social Security and WEP/GPO in SUAAction because SUAAction is a registered as a state PAC. Thus, we cannot use SUAAction money for Congressional races or issues. However, SUAA can be very effective working for changing the WEP/GPO.

Pension funding and healthcare issues will not diminish. The State of Illinois is in serious debt. Our benefits will continue to be a target. We can't afford to sit on the sidelines. Join with us and support this cause. Your contributions are extremely valuable.

## Insurance Committee

During the past year the insurance committee has been busy supporting possible legislation to keep the College Insurance Program (CIP) in the black after FY2009. It is projected that CIP will operate in the red sometime in calendar year 2009. Our insurance committee (a) has been represented and/or testified at five of the Governor's Task Force meetings on CIP in Chicago, (b) gave presentations at JJC's annual meeting and a community college meeting with 13 community colleges represented at JJC, (c) was part of a CIP panel discussion at SUAA state-wide meeting, and (d) represented community colleges at strategy meetings at the City Colleges of Chicago to write and pass CIP legislation. In the next several months to two years, JJCAA will be active in passing CIP legislation for all community colleges. In our next newsletter we will have information on a CIP bill that will be introduced in the state legislature.

At JJCAA's annual meeting the following insurance goal and objectives were discussed:

**Goal**—Improve insurance benefits for JJC retirees.

**Objective 1**—Explore the same CIP (College Insurance Program) benefits but lower rates for spouses.

**Objective 2**—Lobby for parity by creating and maintaining a health care insurance program for retirees of the community college system that is equal to the health insurance benefits provided to retirees of Illinois public universities, the State Employees Health Insurance Program.

**Objective 3**—Monitor the progress of getting the CIP Task Force recommendations passed by the state legislature and the Governor.

**Objective 4**—Lobby our state legislature to pass the recommendations (passed on March 2007) of the CIP Task Force.

**Objective 5**—Work with our state legislature to include a SUAA member on the advisory board if the CIP Task Force recommendations are passed by the state legislature and the Governor.

**Objective 6**—Investigate long term health insurance.

**Objective 7**—Communicate our goal and objectives with our members.

Current members of the Insurance Committee are John Peterson, Chair; Jim Egly, Al Racchini, Walter Zaida, Mary Ann Oetter, Sandra Hopper, Jerry Lewis, and Curt Hiegelke.
